

On page 31 of the February 2007 Bulletin, in your article Attack by King Move! In the game Alekhine – Euwe, World Championship 1937 you have asked in the position after 48...Ra2 (see diagram next column) if readers can find an

even stronger move than Alekhine's 49.Ne2



Here is my answer:

49.Nd5+! K moves 50.Nc3 Rb2/Rc2 51.Ne2 wins OR 50...Rd2 51.Ne4 wins

Alekhine had visualised 49.Ne2 because it blocks the black rook's defence of the bishop at f2 while simultaneously attacking black's Q. However the knight manoeuvre starting with 49.Nd5+ is even stronger. White exploits the poor placement of black's scattered pieces. -Ed

PROBLEM SECTION 11

Solutions to Problems (see p. 17)

Problem no. 1

Kev: 1.Rb5

Threat: None – waiting move Variations: 1...N-random 2.Ra5

> 1...Na7 2.Rb8 1...Ka7 2.Ra5

In the set position, the knight can move to a7 stopping a mating attempt by the rook on the a file. The key move sets the stage for a contingent threat of 2.Ra5 after a random move of the knight. The error introduced by a random move is its inability to interpose on a7. A correction is 1...Na7, which permits a new mate 2.Rb8 due to a self block on a7.

The key is neatly forced as the rook's withdrawal to b4, b3, b2 or b1, though creating the same contingent threat, fail against 1...Nb6!

Problem no. 2

Kev: 1.Rc4 Threat: 2.Nf4

Variations: 1...R(5)-random

2.Rd4 1...Re4 2.Rc5

1...N-random 2.Be4 1...Nd4 2.Rc5

1...Nd6 2.Rxe5

Any random move of the rook on e5 opens up the line of the black bishop on b8 defeating the threat of 2.Nf4. However the move of the rook, as a sort of compensation, also opens up the line of the white bishop on h8 giving rise to a new threat (a contingent threat) of 2.Rd4. Black can apply a correction by moving the rook to a specific square - e4. While this defeats the contingent threat, it introduces a new error of creating a self-block on e4 giving rise to a new mate - 2.Rc5. Similarly a random move of the knight opens up the line of the black rook on f8 defeating the threat of Here too there is a compensating play – opening of the line of the white bishop on h7 and self-pinning of the rook on e5 – that gives rise to another contingent threat of 2.Be5. Two specific moves – Nd4 and Nd6 - of the knight defeat the contingent threat. Both result in self-block permitting new mates -2.Rc5 and 2.Rxe5.

This is typical example of Black Correction, which has four elements.

- 1. A general defence that defeats the original threat
- 2. A general error giving rise to a contingent threat
- 3. A secondary defence correcting the general error and defeating the contingent threat and
- 4. A secondary error permitting a new mate.

Problem no. 3

1.Be8 Key: Threat: 2.Rxd5 Variations: 1...N-random

2.Rxc8

1...Nxe3 2.Oxe3 1...Nc3 2.Ba3 1...Nb4 2.Ra5

1...Nxb6 2.Qxb6 1...Nc7 2.Oc6 1...Ne7 2.Od6 1...Nf6 2.Oxf8

Here the general defence is a random move of the knight, which will control the square d5 from where it has just moved and defeat the threat. However the absence of knight from d5 permits the contingent threat of 2.Rxc8 (if it were on d5 it could have interposed at c7). The general error is the knight's removal from d5. Of all the eight available moves of the knight only one move (Nf4) permits 2.Rxc8 mate. All the remaining seven moves of the knight become secondary defences defeating it. For instance after 1...Nxe3. the white knight's guard of d5 is eliminated and hence the R is needed on d8 to guard it and therefore cannot mate by 2.Rxc8; similarly 1...Nc3 blocks white bishop's guard on d4 and 1...Nf6 blocks the queen's guard on d6. After 1...Nxb6 and 1...Ne7 the knight guards c8 and after 1...Nb4, it can interpose on c6. It is obvious that after 1 Nc7 2 Rxc8 is not even a check!

Each of these secondary defences introduces a new secondary error permitting seven new mates. The actual play with eight different mates is very rich and exhibits a complete black knight wheel.

Problem no. 4

This problem goes a little further than the ones we have seen so far. It does not stop at a secondary defence and a secondary error; it has a tertiary defence and a tertiary error.

Kev: 1.Oc8 Threat: 2.Og8

1...N-random Variations:

2.Rxd3 1...Nb4 2.Ne3 1...Nd4 2.Nb6 1...Kxc4 2.Qxc6

The general defence, a random move of the knight provides the black king a flight square and defeats the threat. However it introduces a general error of opening the c file for the white queen, giving rise to 2.RXd3 mate. The secondary defence is 1...Nb4 protecting d3. The move introduces the secondary error of unpinning the white knight resulting in 2.Ne3 mate. Please note that both the black rooks are pinned and hence cannot capture the checking knight. Now black can try a tertiary defence - 1...Nd4 unpinning the rook on d3 and defeating 2.Ne3. However this tertiary defence leads to a tertiary error of self-block on d4 permitting a new mate – 2.Nb6!

The tertiary play is also described by some as continuous correction or corrected correction. The pinned position of two black rooks and a white knight in the set position gives rise to some interesting unpinning in the variations.

The book "Chess Problems; Introduction to an Art" co-authored by the composers of this problem with R.C.O. Matthews is a rich source of interesting problems and a treasure of information on the subject. Many of the problems in this series are sourced from it.
