Four Uninjured, Two Men Hurt In Route 7 Mishaps

Four Wiltonians were uninjured about 10 a.m. Monday when cars operated by Mrs. Charles M. Reiser of Hulda Hill Road and Edward H. Seagraves, 18, of Mountain Road were involved in a minor accident at the corner of Route 7 and Old Highway. Officer Roy Carlberg of the Westport State Police Barracks issued a warning to Mr. Seagraves for reckless driving.

Mrs. Reiser, her two children, Nicholas, 5, and Timothy, 1, and Mr. Seagraves were uninjured. Officer Carlberg reported that Mrs. Reiser, headed south on Route 7, had signaled a left turn at Old Highway and had stopped for northbound traffic. Mr. Seagraves, also headed south, told the officer that he had seen the signal and attempted to pass to the right of the Reiser car, but misjudged the distance. The left front of Mr. Seagraves' car struck the right rear fender of the Reiser vehicle.

Dozing at the wheel was listed as the cause of a more serious accident on Route 7 about 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, in which John Polesck of Danbury, the operator, and Walter Trusiak of Norwalk, a passenger, were injured. Mr. Trusiak, an employee of the Norwalk Post Office, was reported to be in fair condition this morning at Norwalk Hospital.

Mr. Polesck received a summons from State Policeman James Mc Donald of the Westport Barracks for appearance in Wilton Town Court on August 27 on a charge of reckless driving. The driver, who had been heading north on Route 7, told police that he dozed at the wheel and his car caromed off a guide rail fence on a broad curve opposite the Junior High School driveway. The machine veered across the road, climbed a low embankment, proceeded about 100 feet along the bank and crashed headon into a tree. The injured occupants were taken to Norwalk Hospital in the Wilton ambulance.

Owners Seek Waiver For Business Site In South Wilton

Mrs. Evelyn F. Holly and Dr. Robert E. Appleby have applied to the Zoning Board of Appeals for a variance to permit construction of a two-story business and professional building on Danbury Road in South Wilton. Their application will be heard, along with four other requests, at a public hearing at 8:30 p.m. Monday in the town hall.

Mrs. Holly and Dr. Appleby wish divide a 1.89-acre parcel into two lots—a one-acre parcel containing an existing two-family dwelling, and the remaining .89 acres containing the proposed business and professional building.

Other petitioners whose variance requests were announced by the board last week are: Clarence Cukor of Newtown Turnpike, sideline setback for addition to dwelling; Mrs. Helen P. Gibbons, area variance for two one-acre lots in a two-acre zone on Belden Hill; Edwin N. Homer of Liberty Street, a ruling on the need for a variance to convey a strip of land for improvement to a private road, and William J. Lengyel of Old Boston Road, setback variance to permit construction of a garage.

Park Workers Need More Funds For Excavation

Although contributions have slowed down since the initial response to letters requesting donations to the community park in Cannondale, members of the park committee have discussed excavation of the pond with a contractor whose estimate of cost is substantially what they had expected.

During the discussion, a test hole was dug and the water level determined to be within one inch of what it was two months ago.

In an effort to raise the remaining funds necessary to excavate the pond, members of the park committee are appealing to those persons who neither donated nor pledged during previous campaigns but said they would donate. The committee feels that possibly some of these people may have forgotten to contribute, and urges them to do so.

It is hoped that enough additional funds will be received to excavate during August, when the true water level can be most accurately determined.

Increased Fares Effective Today

An increase of 22½ percent in New Haven Railroad commutation fares went into effect today with the approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission. The increase had been vigorously opposed for several weeks by the Wilton Commuters Association and other such organizations in the New Haven's New York City commuting area.

Under the new schedule 60- and 46-ride tickets from Wilton to Grand Central Station will cost \$34.15 and \$32.50 respectively, instead of \$29.15 and \$26.80.

Owners Prepare Survey To Show Parking Area

W. A. O'Brien and W. B. Weigl, owners of business property in South Wilton which has lately been the object of a zoning controversy, this week produced a map of the entire property to support their claim that it contains more than enough land area to meet parking requirements in a business zone.

The Zoning Board of Appeals last month denied a variance for a building addition on the property, stating that there was insufficient suitable parking area to meet the 4-to-1 ratio to sales space required by the regulations. Construction of the addition, a two-day job, had been completed prior to the board's decision; and the property owners

Democrats to Name Party-Endorsed Candidates at Meeting Tonight

Wilton Republicans will caucus on September 4 to pick party-endorsed candidates for state representative and justices of the peace, according to an announcement last weekend from L. D. Tompkins, town chairman.

Democrats will name their preferences for these offices at a caucus tonight (Wednesday) in the town hall, at which James E. Austin of Olmstead Hill is expected to receive the caucus endorsement for state representative.

Two Republican candidates are in the field for their party's nomination; Rep. John C. Donaldson who has held the post for three terms, and Attorney Morris Earle of Nod Hill Road, prosecuting grand juror in the Wilton Town Court. With the setting of the caucus date this week, Mr. Earle reaffirmed his candidacy and stated some of his principal views in a communication to the press.

"It is not enough for the Republican Party to defeat the Democrats in the Town of Wilton, or town," Mr. Earle declared. "As Republican with Eisenhower, to carry the nomination we cannot, if we would, escape the burden of the Gettysburg Address; that government of the people, by the people, for the people shall not perish from the earth."

As for legislation which he favors, Mr. Earle declared that "Governor Ribicoff's policy against speeding should be enacted into law," and that the "Connecticut statute on drunken driving should be revised. All operators involved in accidents involving injury or damage over \$100, or other suspect drivers, should be required to take a breathometer or other test to determine the alcoholic equivalent content of their blood, and when such test reveals more than a prescribed minimum, a presumption should follow of statutory violation."

Other legislation which he would support, Mr. Earle said would include a law that persons under the age of 18 should not drive between the hours of sunset and sunrise, and a federal law "to bar the portrayal on television or cinema of the dealing of violent, cruel death."

"Daily, men by the buckboard-load are explicitly murdered on television for the entertainment of lots . . . Isn't it really a wondrous day."

Mr. O'Brien said yesterday that he was trying to reach members of the appeals board to ask for a rehearing on the basis of new evidence contained in the new map.
