


▲ The Army and Navy combined to cite outstanding defense production plants contributing to the war effort.

March 27, 1942 the United Government States issued Limitation Order 80, prohibiting the manufacture of leisure products from aluminum, and ordered that all leisure industries of aluminum fabrication be suspended indefinitely. There was a significant period of time from the end of leisure production to war production putting tremendous financial pressure on these companies.

Already producing converted outboard motors for war, Evinrude produced a modified 4-60 (derated to 50HP at 5,000 rpm) 4-cylinder "Storm Boat Motor" and the 4cylinder 9.7hp "Light Four." Evinrude outboards moved our boys to the beachhead, rescued our pilots who crashed at sea, and powered the barges for the Army Corps of Engineers.

Johnson Motors of Waukegan, Illinois, division of OMC (Outboard Motors Corporation) built sophisticated components for aircraft and tanks, as well as producing 22 horsepower outboard motors.

Johnson Motors had developed a sophisticated die cast process to produce Oxygen flow regulators for the war effort. Also awarded to Johnson were contracts to build Bendix airplane starters, aircraft instruments, the "Handy Billy" fire fighting pump, hydraulic pumps, tank magnetos, and the 22 horsepower 2-cylinder outboard motor and more.

One of these days, restrictions will be lifted on outboard sales for pleasure use.

While Johnson has the facilities to build a major share of all outboard motors manufactured, there will definitely be some lag between the lifting of restrictions and full deliveries of all Sea-Horse models.


