But can God help with real life...daily life...life when it strays so far from our idyllic dreams? Cindy Schroeder is a friend of mine, and her testimony is a witness to the amazing power of a father's love, both on earth and from heaven. Here is her story...

My family and I arrived in Atlanta on February I, 2001. I have a daughter in 4th grade and boy/girl twins in Kindergarten, and I am a single parent. I grew up in West Texas and came from a big family where divorce was never much an issue. I have a wonderful dad that has a quiet way about him. He was constant, loving and always there. But then so was my Father in heaven. I had been taught that this Father in heaven was always

with me and always loved me, but He seemed awfully quiet also. When my marriage, and my world, fell apart I came to know my dad as someone so brokenhearted over his daughter's pain that his eyes filled with tears and his voice would break when we spoke. I began to understand his loyalty to me, that he would never give up on me or despise me for mistakes I had made.

I saw an unconditional love from dad to me. I also began to know this Heavenly Father of mine in a whole new way. God is not so quiet with me anymore and through my dad I can begin to understand the pain this God of mine feels for his daughter. He shows me daily His constant presence in my life and just when I think I cannot take anymore He reminds me of His forgiveness for all my past and daily mistakes. Scripture to Remember

I John 3:1

I How great is the love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are!

Galatians 4:6

God wants us to know him as Father. He is so passionate about it that he brings it up over 200 times in the Bible! Meditate on these verses and consider what it means God to be your Father.

REFLECTION JOURNAL ON YOUR "UP" RELATIONSHIP

After reading and considering each scripture listed on page 4, record your personal response to the corresponding study questions.

WHAT IS THE JOB OF A FATHER? God often refers to himself as "Father." What is he risking by describing himself this way? On the other hand, what important qualities could he be revealing to us in calling himself our Father?
How is God's version of Fatherhood different from what we see on earth?
The Psalmist called God a "father to the fatherless?" Are there ways that you feel fatherless? What needs might God be able to meet that an earthly father cannot? (Psalm 68:5)
Consider the verses from Hebrews. What is good about discipline? How have you learned from the times God, as your father, has disciplined you? (Hebrews 12:9-10)
Consider the verses in 1st John and Galatians. In Jesus' first language of Aramaic, "abba" is much like the English word "daddy." How might such an intimate relationship with God change your understanding of him? (1 John 3:1, Galatians 4:6)
Write down your own definition of unconditional love. Now spend some time imagining the love and care God the Father has for all His children. With His unconditional love in mind, spend a few moments talking with God about how His unfailing love is making a difference in your life.

Wy father left me an amazing legacy. I have most of the books that he and his father used to assist them with their Bible study before the advent of Bible CDs, Encyclopedias on the Internet and Bible software for laptop computers and ipods. Many of my fondest memories are of quietly sitting with him at the dining room table and watching him study and make marginal notes in his Bible. I could be found looking over his

shoulder as he wrote sermon outlines in spiral bound. Blue Horse school note-

books with his beautiful penmanship. I still have those notebooks in my


close to him.

love of the contents of the book. But for me, it has become inseparable.
