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RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

Advent is a season of anticipation. We think of all the preparations that go into Christmas and make lists of the things we have to do. But Jim Taylor, a free-lance writer in BC, reminds us that we should also expect the unexpected. He tells of going into a busy pub in Montreal and ordering a vodka and orange juice with a single cranberry. The bartender, busy with other orders, misheard him and prepared a drink of Kaluha and cranberry juice. The waitress was apologetic, but he said, "Before I throw it out, let's see what it tastes like." He found it delicious! His wife agreed. The Kaluha took the edge off the sourness of the cranberry and the tartness of the cranberry took away the cloying sweetness of the Kaluha. "I now mix Kaluha and cranberry for guests," Taylor says. The unexpected mistake turned out to be a great gift.

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WARDENS' REPORT

Here we are again: approaching the end of a calendar year and on the verge of a busy holiday season. As usual, November was an active month.

For the second year now we distributed our *Welcoming Hearts, Minds and Spirit* postcard to 17,000 neighbours during the second week of November. We distributed the card via postal walk throughout the parish earlier in November and we've had some very positive feedback. A thank you to Bob Cameron for calculating the quantities involved and coordinating distribution from the printer through three area post offices.

Brian Prideaux led the men in organizing a very successful spaghetti supper on November 10th. The Van Lane Room was full with parishioners and neighbours enjoying dinner, a little opera music, and lots of good fellowship. A little over \$500 was raised for Faithworks and we had a special visit from Maria Minna, MP for Beaches—East York.

The ACW has announced that their annual November Rummage Sale has been postponed until the spring so please hang on to your contributions and stand by for a new date

Work to the roof of the South porch was completed quickly earlier in the month. The roof has a surprisingly large surface area, extending back to the peak of the main roof, and removal of the multiple layers of shingles and shakes relieves the weight burden on the structure significantly. The work was financed through our *R* & *R* Fund.

We are now in the last stages of our *R & R Fundraising Campaign* and we stand at a total of \$92,000 raised, just \$8,000 shy of our \$100,000 campaign objective. The remaining \$8,000 is needed to apply towards a new floor in the body of the church, which is badly in need of replacement.

We will publish a list of major *R* & *R* Contributors in the Courier in the New Year. These names will be cast in a plague to be stationed in a place of honour in the church alongside the names of contributors from previous eras. If you are able to help us cross this final stretch, please designate your special donation to the *R* & *R* Fund.

PROPHETS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

The early Christians found in the sayings of the Old Testament prophets predictions of the coming of Christ but it would be a mistake to see the prophets simply as people who could see into the future. Their chief function was to remind Israel and Judah of God's will in the present. Prophecy took many forms in ancient Israel, often associated with "speaking in tongues" or the gift of ecstatic speech. Saul and David, the first two kings of Israel, manifested this form of prophecy, but so did many prophets of the heathen gods. As a result the Hebrews began to look for other qualities in God's prophets. These included faithfulness to God's covenant with Moses and their call to "do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly" with God. The life of a prophet was not an easy one. They often suffered for telling people truths they did not want to hear. But they could also speak tenderly of God's love for his people and God's yearning to see them mend their ways and return. Christians count John the Baptist, with his call to repentance, within the long line of prophets.

Bible Lore

On the first Sunday of Advent we begin reading from the lectionary cycle for Year A. Through this year we shall be reading from the gospel according to Matthew. Called Levi in Mark and Luke, Matthew was a tax collector at Capernaum when Jesus called him to become a disciple. His job was to collect tolls due to the tetrarch Herod on goods passing over the Sea of Galilee. Tax collecting was a despised trade in 1st century Palestine. Tax collectors and sinners were often spoken of in the same breath. Jesus was criticised for inviting such people to follow him, but he replied, "I am not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." Matthew's response to Jesus brought about a radical change in his life. According to tradition, Matthew went on to write the gospel that bears his name. His authorship of the first gospel is not widely accepted among biblical scholars today but it is possible that Matthew contributed some of the information that went into it. We know very little of his subsequent career. The early church historian Eusebius says that he proclaimed the gospel to his fellow Jews. The Roman Martyrology says that he met his death in Ethiopia although other sources claim that he died in Persia or on the shores of the Persian Gulf.


The church office will be closed from December 22 to January 1 inclusive. The answering machine will be monitored during this time.

DONE: Reinforce Structure of South Porch, New Rectory Roof, New Rectory Furnace, Repair Wheelchair Ramp on South Side, Refinish Doors on South Side, Repair Lighting and re-paint Street Signs, Paint Exterior Trim including Bell Tower, Recondition Organ, Patch Brickwork around Bell Tower, Replace Eaves Trough on South Porch, Strip & Repair Roof on South Porch. **ONGOING:** Restoration of stained glass windows (expected to take another full year).

FINAL FEAT: Repair floor in body of Church and Replace tiles.

We announced the Restoration & Repair Fund in the fall of 2006 and the response has been inspiring. We stand this December at \$92,000, just \$8,000 shy of our overall objective, with three calendar months to go.

Much is accomplished. Some work continues. We're now taking aim at the significant task of stripping the floor in the body of the church, repairing the sub floor and adding new floor tiles. The original floor can date back to the 1930's in spots and is badly in need of repair.
