RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

In my annual report to vestry I spoke of the distinction between those who simply attend church and those who think of themselves as members. Of course, these are not water-tight compartments. Members usually attend and attendees often consider themselves members. However, I still think it's a useful distinction. Some twenty odd years ago in a study prepared for the Diocese of Toronto, sociologist Reginald Bibby wrote about a "consumer mentality" among Anglicans; I think he was addressing much the same issue.

One who simply attends church (and believe me, I'm glad they do) is probably looking for good liturgy, uplifting music, and a meaningful sermon. If they don't find what they are looking for they will move on. The same is true with Church School. I remember a family when I was at another church that came with several children one Sunday. "Do you have a Sunday School?" I was asked. "Unfortunately not," I had to reply, "but I've been trying to get some people involved in starting one. Would you be interested in helping?" They never came back.

I can't blame busy people for wanting to let someone else carry the load on weekends but the fact is that without our volunteers we can do nothing. A member recognises this and gets involved: singing in the choir, serving on the Chancel Guild, participating in Christian Education activities, and so much more. There is a challenging and rewarding job for anyone who wants one.

God bless everyone who worships here and supports us, but we need people who really see St. John's as their church and are ready to roll up their sleeves and make this the best, the liveliest, the most worshipful, the happiest church in the community. Are you up to the job?



FROM THE CHURCH CALENDAR

February 9 – HANNAH GRIER COOME
 Founder of the Sisterhood of Saint John the Divine

Religious communities in the Anglican church were suppressed during the Reformation but were restarted three hundred years later during the spiritual revival called the Oxford Movement. One community was founded in Canada by Hannah Grier Coome, an English widow, who established a community for women in Toronto in 1884. During her married life Hannah had received spiritual help from the clergy at the parish of St. John the Divine, Kennington, in London. Out of gratitude she dedicated her newly-founded community to Saint John the Divine. The first obligation of the sisters was prayer, but they also engaged in parish work, nursing, teaching, and social service. Bigoted Orangemen threatened to burn down their convent, accusing them of being Roman Catholics in disguise, but these prejudices were overcome by the obvious devotion of the sisters to the poor. One of their first works of mercy was caring for the wounded of the North West Rebellion of 1885. At first they lived in a renovated stable but in 1889 they moved to a more adequate building and in 1953 the mother house was transferred to suburban Willowdale. In 2007 they moved again, this time to a new convent beside St. John's Rehabilitation Hospital in North York, continuing a presence that began almost 125 years ago.

Bible Lore

Last month I used the term "synoptic" to describe the gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Some of you may not be familiar with the term. The word synoptic comes from the Greek. It literally means "seeing with the same eyes." For centuries people have noticed that Matthew, Mark, and Luke tell the same story in virtually the same order and use much the same vocabulary. The term "synoptic problem" was coined to describe the analysis of both similarities and differences among these gospels. Most modern scholars agree that Mark was published in Rome in the early 60s AD. Matthew and Luke drew upon Mark when writing their gospels a decade later and in addition drew on another source, sometimes called Q (from the German Quelle, or "source"). This is called the "two source" theory. We can also find material that appears only in Matthew or only in Luke, sometimes called M or L respectively. Of course, this does not suggest that these sources were ever written down. In the culture of the time it would have been common to preserve and pass on important traditions by word of mouth.
